It was the third consecutive Games that the Yukoners were selected the

most sportsmanlike contingent.

The record will show that the N.W.T. team captured the Games' flag as unofficial Games' winners. The Territories, with strong performances in hockey, curling. Arctic sports, indoor soccer and badminton, collected 49 gold ulus and 113 in all.

Alaskans were right on their heels all the way, dominating the shooting and cross country skiing events to earn 42 in 1986.






