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

### Ordinary performance, extraordinary results

What started out as an ordinary cultural performance at Chugiak Senior Center turned out to be an extraordinary reunion of long lost family and friends.

The Atak Dancers, a group of Native performers from the Aleutian Chain, went to the Chugiak Senior Center to do a few dances and have lunch with the center residents.

During a performance for the people in the Adult Daycare, Ethan Petticrew, one of the dancers, was looking around the room.

"I was looking because I like to look at people who are watching us," Petticrew said. "As I was looking, I thought 'Gee, this face looks really familiar."

At the end of the performance, Petticrew went to the familiar face and said "Alice?"

Alice Martin, an elderly woman whose mind is slipping, recognized the dancer. Martin just happened to be Petticrew's wife Jolene's aunt. Petticrew hadn't seen Martin in over eight years, he wasn't even certain where she was living.

"She grabbed me and gave me a great big hug and a kiss," said Petticrew. "She didn't want to let me go.

"It was really a nice surprise for me," Petticrew said. "I was only wishing my wife and children were with me."

Petticrew, a teacher in a school of 21 students and father of two children ages 8 and 3, said seeing Martin made the entire Arctic Winter Games experience better than he ever could have imagined.

"They had a family reunion right here," said Nancy Lourie, director of Adult Daycare at the center. "It was such an upbeat time."

However, Lourie said Martin wasn't the only Adult Daycare participant to renew an old friendship.

A chaperon of the dance group, Duane Magoon, and a daycare resident named Joel Tegeler just happened to be old high school classmates.

"Here they were swapping pictures and family stories," Lourie said.

"I was very, very surprised," said Tegeler, longtime Alaska resident. Tegeler said he met Magoon through his brother many years ago. "That was very exciting for me. It had been

"Ihat was very exciting for me. It had been over 20 years (since I'd seen Magoon)," Tegeler said. "I was trying to figure out what his shirt said when he recognized me. He rec-

ognized me even with my beard."

Tegeler, who suffers from Multiple Sclerosis, said he was very thrilled about the re-

Magoon wasn't available for comment, Tegeler said he had already returned home.

As for Petticrew and Martin, Petticrew said he hopes to return to the center before he leaves the Games. He said he will show off family pictures and stories.

"I can't wait to call my wife and tell her," Petticrew said.

Lourie said all of the Arctic Winter Games participants that have visited the center have provided a "boost" to the center.

Volunteer work for the 1996 Arctic Winter Games is a family affair for Kynda Richardson. She involved her six children, Edward, 14, Olivia, 13, Dana, 8, Kyle, 7, Avery, 5 and Justin, 2, in helping her stuff envelopes for fundraising dinner auction and helping out at BaBa's Cove, the Arctic Winter Games' souvenir store.

Working with her children is not new. Richardson, 33, is a Boy and Cub Scout leader as well as being a committee member for Pack 27, Troop 27, Varsity Teams and Explorer Group. She is the Roundtable Commissioner for the Cub Scouts for the Eklutna District. Richardson handles advances for the Cub Scouts and is the secretary for the Boy Scout Committee. She became a Scout leader in 1989.

After hearing about the Arctic Winter Games' need for volunteers, Richardson thought it would be a good idea to get local scout troops involved.

"I personally went and volunteered," she said. "They didn't ask me or anything. I went to the Boy Scouts office and told them it would be great to get involved in this."

She helped out at a couple of volunteer orientations, inventoried and sold Games merchandise at the office and in the store in Eagle River. She designed six posters for the Volunteer Rally on Feb. 24 at the request of Nancy Killoran, Games Media Coordinator. Richardson sorted through dozens of photos showing volunteers participating in assorted Games activities. Once the selections were made, she mounted the photos on

"She (Nancy) just said, 'can you do this for me?' so I did," Richardson said.

In addition to designing duties, Richardson solicited items for the dinner auction, arranging for pickup of donations and with the help of her children addressed and stuffed invitations to the auction. She will also chauffeur VIPs around the Games

"You can always find an hour or two help in the week regardless of how busy think we are and even the littlest things important. As I got phone calls, they alw came at a point where I could handle it."


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




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## Radio operators ham it up for Games

Most of us have probably never given much thought to the value of ham radios and their operators, but their support of the Arc-tic Winter Games (AWG) is something that should make us stand up and take notice.

Over 40 amateur radio operators from Southcentral Alaska have set up an elaborate communications network in support of the Games.

Larry Strain, president of the Anchorage Amateur Radio Club, began working with the Communications Committee over a year before the Games to determine the communications needs that the operators could fulfill.

The result of this planning is a system of

two communications networks and a Special

Events Amateur Radio Station.

The Special Events Station is set up at Chugiak High School, across from the Mission Office. It is connected to a large antenna, which was erected on the roof of the school with the help of Ken Allen, an instructor at Chugiak who is also an amateur operator.

The purpose of the Special Events Station is to make contacts with other radio amateurs worldwide, and to promote the Arctic Winter

To date, contacts with stations in Russia, Tahiti, Japan and Brazil have been made, as well as with numerous stations in Canada and

But the most useful service the network has served in the Games is to allow athletes to send messages to their parents all over the Lower 48 and other countries.

"So far, we've been given 58 messages, and only four of those were undeliverable because they had the wrong phone numbers written down," Strain said, "and we couldn't help that." Special commemorative certificates will be

sent to all the stations contacted during the

Another helpful service provided by the operators is a Venue Communications Net-work, which operates between the Chugiak, Fire Lake and Gruening villages and the Kincaid Park, Alpenglow Ski Area, Media Center and dog track venues, Strain said.

Any Games participant, official, volunteer or even visitor can send messages between venues and villages by filling out a message form at one of the venues' Communications Message Centers and giving it to a radio op-

And in the event of emergency, people can be dispatched to any location to send messages, Strain said.

Outgoing message forms are color-coded blue and have the instructions for their use on the back. The radio operator will relay the message to its destination venue or village where it will be copied on a message form and delivered.

Another network run by radio operators helps ensure the accuracy of the Games' re-

The packet radio network uses a "digipeter" to dispatch the latest results to the Media Center

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"In fact, this packet radio system has been on every space shuttle ever launched — they can communicate with (people on earth) using ham radios, he said.

(Being an operator) is a fun hobby, and technical-type people get interested in it.

In addition to operating the communications networks, the amateur radio operators have been assisting the communications and security staff in maintaining their radio equip-

Thursday's earthquake provided an excel-lent example of the usefulness of these net-

It seems the quake temporarily knocked out the antenna that was being used by the AWG's security system. Lil Martin, director of the Amateur Radio Emergency System, had that system activated within 15 minutes of the quake, Strain said.

If an emergency had occurred during that time, then the radio operators could have stepped in immediately with a fully-operational communications network, he said.

In fact, it was a ham radio operator that first got news to the Lower 48 that half of Anchorage was destroyed by the March 27, 1964 earthquake, Strain said.

"So amateur radio has a long, illustrious

history in Alaska," he said.

And by the way, if you're wondering about the origin of the term "ham radio operator,

don't bother.
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#### Alaska wrestlers win 10 gold ulus

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





On the surface, it looks like a week of fun, free shows for children at Adante's Restaurant. But there is more going on than just entertainment. Children are learning about Alaska history. They are being encouraged to become avid readers. Through games and music, they are given the message that they can feel good about themselves, and there-fore can be more tolerant of others. They are being exposed to different languages and cultures. And the adults who escort them to these activities are rediscovering the children in themselves.

Glenn Guy, aka "Dusty Sourdough," is on stage daily through Saturday (1 to 2 p.m.). He looks like the quintessential Alaska man of the 1800s who has come forward through time to tell about life on the Last Frontier. Through Dusty's adventures, Guy paints pictures in the minds of his listeners about how difficult, dangerous and downright interesting life was here a century ago. He closes by telling the children that they can't play the game if they can't read the directions. He believes his reading message is successful because, "Dusty Sourdough is a character, not a real grownup, so they listen to him and want to learn to

When singer/composer Al Levy and his little partner Adam came on stage Wednesday afternoon, they got everybody into the act. Levy writes children's songs and his son Adam has been singing for most of his 2-1/2 years of life. They both play guitar. They sang about animals and pizza and self-esteem —

songs that required audience participation. Levy asked the children to sing along and copy his gestures. But he got a much bigger response than that. Parents began to sing, too, and to dance with their children. Levy expected that to happen.
"I'd rather play for kids than in a smokey

beer hall. Kids are always in the mood to sing and play along. Then adults get into the act and lose their inhibitions when they see the kids doing it," he said.

Levy is a youth counselor at McLaughlin Correction Center and he's been a professional

musician for 15 years. He uses music to make life, simple, but symbolic — songs about love people feel good about themselves. He got a great audience response Wednesday, especially on the songs where children got to make animal noises and the song that incorporated each of the youngsters' names. He is starting a singing class for children under 5 years of age. For more information, call 272-SING.

Each afternoon at 3 p.m.at Adante's, there are cultural performance. Wednesday's cultural team was from Tyumen. The group, Zhuravushka, takes its name from a little Russian bird. They sang songs about everyday and deep feelings. The audience didn't un-derstand the symbolism, but simply enjoyed the colorful costumes and the sounds of their voices and balalaikas. Lead singer Tanva Rakitina said the language was no barrier. They felt like the audience was supporting them, especially the children

"Children feel the music. They don't need the language," she said.

Rakitina and her partners were smiling af-ter the performance. They claimed they would remember this day for a long time to come.

In late game action Wednesday, Greenland defeated NWT 5-3 in junior girls play. Ane Mettid Fontain and Marianne Neilsen scored two goals each for Greenland, while Kelly Loubert had two for NWT.

In addition to Jarkov's seven goals during Magadan's 13-1 victory over Yukon, Rodiov Tcheremnov had three, and teammate Ian Kozatchko two.

Alberta defeated Greenland 6-4 in boys junior play and Yukon held off Alberta 7-5 in juvenile boys action. Yukon had held a 5-1 lead at the end of the first half, but Kyle Finner and Graham Sim scored two goals each to help in the complact.

The Team Alaska juvenile girls scored a big win in defeating NWT 9-4 early Thursday. Laura Wood, Stephanie Krawczykl, Kelly Quinn, Carly Tibbets and Jessica Szandland each scored one goal in the second half to put the game away. Szandland and Pamye Winders had two additional goals in the first half. Elizabeth Boncher had two goals for NWT.

Magadan defeated NWT 6-3 helped by Jarkov's three goals. Darryl Schick and Isaac Ayiku had one goal each for NWT.

Simmons and Arnold lost the first game 8-15. Using their quick feet and excellent playing skills, the pair rallied to win the second game


15-10. Simmons and Arnold overcame a 5-10 slip in the third game to win the final game 15-12.

Speedskating Club is facilitating the change.
"We are where Northwest Territories and Alberta were a couple of years ago," said Lance Smith, treasurer of the club and volunteer at the Games. That is why the Speedskating Club was formed and sanctioned by the Amateur Speedskating Union of the United States (ASU).

The club is the first recognized club in the state. And thanks to becoming sanctioned the Arctic Winter Games had help from Doc Savage and Tim Quinn of ASU. Savage helped with organizing the races and Quinn

"This (becoming sanctioned) is a big deal.
We're actually part of a network," Smith said.
"We did it so we could coach the kids and

they could have access to different stuff," Smith said. He said a big part of being sanc-tioned is getting insurance so indoor ice time can be booked.

Similar clubs in Northwest Territories and Alberta have over 100 skaters. He said the best of those skaters are at the Games.
"That is who we are racing against, so if

you see we got a medal it's because we worked our feet off," Smith said.

The Anchorage - Eagle River club, only a few months old, had 12 skaters in the Games competition. The 13th skater on Team Alaska is from Fairbanks.

"It's a pretty big turnout from the club," Smith said. He said he would like to see other clubs form around the state.


Now that the club is sanctioned, skaters can earn badges for moving up, are able to qualify for scholarships and will receive a
