Downtown opens its arms to the Games

Downtown businesses are taking it to a whole new level in welcoming Arctic Winter Games participants to Grande Prairie.

Nine businesses are "adopting" the

nine contingents participating.

"What we wanted was to make all the athletes and spectators feel welcome, but we didn't really have any sense of what we could do," says Helen Rice, director of the Grande Prairie DownTown Association.

She met with Games officials to

discuss what could be done to make the visiting athletes feel at home.

They came up with the adoption idea about a month ago as a way to show visitors "true Grande Prairie hospitality," she says. She asked downtown businesses to sign up if they were interested and the list filled

pretty much instantly, says Rice.

The stores will put up their contingent's flag in their window, have an information display inside and host a massive card of congratulations that people will be encouraged to sign.

The card will be presented to each contingent's chefs de mission. It will also be a good way for people to find out more about the visiting contingents, as some are from as far away as Russia and Greenland. "It's a learning experience plus a fun experience," Rice says.

Rice adds she hopes that there will be a connection between the businesses and their adopted contingent, that it will be a good opportunity for the visitors and their hosts to get to know each other.

"We hope they feel really proud as well as really pleased that the community appreciates their participation," she says, "We hope it gives them that little extra stimulus to perform outstandingly."

New Horizon Co-op is one of the nine supporting a contingent. They don't know which one yet, says Mikki Redlick, marketing manager, but it hasn't held them back from painting their massive storefront windows with Arctic Winter Games designs.

"We wanted to do something in support of the Games, we thought we could at least decorate our store," she says. The windows were painted in early February. "My inspiration was to hopefully start a chain reaction and have everybody else on Richmond Avenue paint their windows as well," she says.

It's a "heartfelt" thing, businesses decorating to welcome the participants, says Redlick. "I think the message is that we think it's

an absolutely fantastic event and we're going to do everything we can to support them and accommodate them while they're here."

IRA REDWOOD:

FEATURED VOLUNTEER

With family roots going back three generations in the Grande Prairie area, Ira Redwood sees the 2010 Arctic Winter Games as a way to keep active and involved in the community.

"Community work is very much in my blood," says Redwood, who has volunteered with the Kinsmen Club of Canada, the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, Scouts Canada, the Salmon River Watershed Roundtable, and other naturalist groups, ranging from grunt work, to public speaker, to president.

"Being active in one's community is a critical part of anyone's well-being, in my mind. Knowing that you've done a good job, without any other incentive than to do good, is vastly rewarding."

Redwood, born in the year Grande Prairie became incorporated as a city, found out about the Arctic Winter Games via a television broadcast – on someone else's set! With his curiosity piqued, he did some research on the Games.

"These Games are unique to the

Northern Hemisphere, and for the most part, provide opportunities to First Nation and other remote northern communities that would not be available otherwise.

"It also seems to me the Arctic athletes are just as passionate about the individual sports they're competing in as any Olympic athlete," explains Red-

wood, an experienced snowshoer, and downhill and cross-country skier.

"I've learned more about dog-sledding (or mushing). Grande Prairie is a great place to be holding these Games, since it already has much of the infrastructure needed for such an event."

Redwood, who works as a civil lab technologist at the Grande Prairie office of Genivar, feels the most rewarding part of the volunteer experience is meeting a number of wonderful, positive, co-operative people – some of whom are his old schoolmates!

"The best thing about the Games, though, is to be just out there, helping the athletes and spectators have the time of their lives."

Culinary mentorship program gives young foodies great opportunity

Youths interested in getting a taste of the culinary world had until earlier this week to apply to participate in a food mentorship program sponsored by the organizers of the upcoming Arctic Winter Games.

During the Games, two local restaurants, Jake's Down South and Padrino's Italian Ristorante, will be serving a special menu of dishes from around the circumpolar world.

Games organizers partnered with Jake's to allow up to four students between the ages of 15 and 21 to work with a mentor to help with the entire process from prepping to cooking to catering.

The initial application deadline was the end of November, but was pushed back because nobody has come forward, much to the amazement of Chantale Doucette-Chalifoux, the head of culture for the Games.

"I am (surprised)."

"But since the (Daily Herald-Tribune) sort of highlighted it a couple of weeks back, we really expected someone to come forward and express an interest in it."

Jake's owner Todd Zahorodniuk says the experience would be beneficial to those contemplating a career in the culinary arts.

Applicants would be working directly with Corey Rankel, a Red Seal Chef, he said.

"You're going to get the work experience of working in a kitchen, you're going to get the experience of learning how to properly prepare food, you're going to get the experience of working in a busy atmosphere," he explained.

"There's all those things and then, you know, for somebody if they're not sure what they want to do, it's a great thing for them to come in and try it out, see if it's their cup of tea and then they can actually carry on with it from there."

Doucette-Chalifoux said the number of hours someone would work during the Games, whether it's a day or two or more, would depend on how many people sign

up.
"We haven't really set the parameters ... In the beginning the program was going to be, if we had them in November, we were actually going to have them prep and cater a few of the Arctic Winter Games functions in January and February, so they would have had some experience prior," she said.

"So now, to be honest, it's going to be left up to Jake's as to how many days that they can have them in there."

"Our industry always needs people, and it is a fun industry. I mean, you have to work hard at it, but it's an extremely fun industry, you meet lots of people, and it's a very social atmosphere.

"So, yes, by all means I would love to see some step up to the plate and jump in with it," Zahorodniuk said.

"It's nothing to be intimidated by, if that's a factor," Doucette-Chalifoux said.

"I think it would just be a fun, overall overview of something if you're interested in that field, but I don't think that anyone needs to be intimidated that there's a big workload or anything like that."

The rewards of sports competition



Ulus & Awards

For athletes at the Arctic Winter Games, there is no greater thrill than winning an ulu. The medal's name and shape are borrowed from the all-purpose knife traditionally used by the Inuit. Ulus are awarded in bronze, silver, and gold; recognizing the hard work and commitment of athletes with a unique memento from the North.

For many of the sports featured in the Arctic Winter Games, medals are awarded at individual sport venues as winners are determined. Traditional 'Medal Rounds' will occur in only five of 21 sports; basketball, curling, hockey, soccer, and volleyball.



The Hodgson Trophy

Despite the obvious importance of a com-

petitive spirit in athletic competitions, the Arctic Winter Games have always emphasized fair play over the need for victory. Since its introduction in 1978, the Hodgson Trophy symbolizes the ideals of fair play and team spirit, and is awarded to the participating contingent who best embodies those ideals. Team members also receive a unique pin in recognition of this accomplishment.

Donated by Commissioner Stuart Hodgson, this distinctive trophy is a one-of-a-kind piece of Inuit artwork from the Canadian Arctic. Its main feature is a six-foot narwhal tusk mounted on a soapstone base and decorated with scrimshaw. A carved walrus wraps itself around the tusk at the base, and a carved bear clings to the tusk's upper reaches, symbolizing the efforts of participants to reach for the top through their endeavours.

Votes from mission staff, registered coaches, major officials from each sport, Arctic Winter Games International Committee members, registered media, and the President, General Manager, and Sport Manager for the Host Society are tallied to award the trophy in a ceremony that highlights each Arctic Winter Games.

A new and improved Nitehawk



Arctic Winter Games a great reason for facility upgrades

Nitehawk Ski Hill has had a major facelift for the Arctic Winter Games. The hill now has a brand-new snowmaking system, a half-pipe and 4,000 square feet of new chalet space.

"It's had a huge impact on us," says Nitehawk manager Duane Stevenson, "having the cause of the Arctic Winter Games. It gave us the legs to go to the provincial and municipal governments and ask for help. And they came through."

Some parts of the old snowmaking system dated back to 1972, Stevenson said. "For 12 years we've wanted to upgrade the snowmaking system." Nitehawk received a \$500,000 grant from the Alberta government last June. The ski hill had to come up with matching donations from the area and "the community really came through for us," says Stevenson, with local businesses giving \$200,000 worth of pipe, trucking services and welders, naming just a few of the donations that came through.

Installing the system was to take two years, but it's already over 85% complete. "That

was our summer," Stevenson says. Having the Games coming has made for a busy year, he says. "It's worked out very well," he says, "It's been a lot of work on our parts as well. It's been quite a draw on staff but also a huge growing opportunity."

The new snowmaking machine, which was sourced from New York, churned out snow from early December to early January at a rate of 800 gallons per minute. "We've made a tremendous amount of snow," Stevenson says. "We're ready to go."

The second big project was the half-pipe. Construction started in August. "It was a lot of earthwork," Stevenson says. They had to clear the brush, build berms and ensure proper drainage for the 83 m long, 13 feet high, 13 degree half-pipe. The pipe was open for the public by mid-January.

"It's very exciting, fantastically exciting," says Amy Penson, Chair of Snowboarding for the Games, of the changes at Nitehawk. Penson has known the ski hill for 18 years as a skier, employee, management and volunteer. She says the Games-fuelled improvements have been on "wish lists" for a long time. "We were sending kids to competitions and they'd never ridden a half-pipe before." Now the club is more competitive and more confident, she says.

"It's going to be nighttime with music, lights, skiing and snowboarding, it is going to be a party!" she says.

The half-pipe will be lit up the night of Wednesday, March 10 for the hybrid freestyle skiing and snow-boarding event during the Games.

And for those who might get cold, there is a lot more space inside. The chalet is 4,000 square feet bigger now. The City of Grande Prairie, County of Grande Prairie and MD of Greenview donated \$160,000 together and GPRC donated four school portables. In late January, construction was 90% complete. The expanded cafeteria, locker room, dressing area and food services space will all be ready for the Games, Stevenson says. It's tripled the amount of space the Ski Patrol had before, he says.

The parking lot is double the size as well now to make space for nine donated Atco trailers that will serve as clubhouses for the visiting athletes.

People should know that the ski hill will be open to the public during the Games, Stevenson says, which he calls a "huge opportunity" for the community. "I don't think there's any other sport in the Arctic Winter Games where you can participate at the same time you can spectate," he says.





Games cultural ambassador introduced



Celeigh Cardinal welcomes chance to represent city's arts and cultural community

The Arctic Winter Games added another major component last week when Celeigh Cardinal was named the Cultural Ambassador.

Cardinal, a 29-year-old singer-songwriter from Grande Prairie, said she was initially surprised about being asked to become involved, but has since embraced it and is looking forward to the event's start March 6.

"It was kind of overwhelming at first, but I'm really honoured and proud to be offered this opportunity to represent the arts and culture in Grande Prairie," said Cardinal, who has been part of the local music scene for more than 10 years.

"As someone who isn't very athletic, to be included in the cultural component helps the Games reach a broader demographic. I hope that my participation in this helps represent the vibrancy of the culture in our community."

Cardinal's role will involve participation in the opening and closing ceremonies, medal presentations for the traditional Dene games, as well as attending and performing at the multiple gala evenings.

She was approached about the position in late January.


"I've got some information about the participating countries that I'll be taking a look at," Cardinal said.

"Until I actually learned about the cultural aspect of it I had no idea what kind of role I would play. It's very exciting and it's an opportunity for me to meet new people and to get out there and explore the other cultures.

"As a musician and a Métis woman I've always held strongly to the richness of my heritage, making it a foundation to each of the many paths I've chosen to explore."

"The passion that she brings, and the music and the pride in her heritage it what makes her the perfect fit for our organization," said Debbie Reid, president of the AWG host society.

"Her personal philosophy in holding pride in her cultural background leads to a stronger and more grounded person, and that's what we're hoping that our participants will take away from this experience with us," she continued.



I would drive home from work and see the snowboarders flying down their revamped gravel pit, I would hear the drum dancing from the Dene Games tent as I walked on the frozen trails of Frame Lake. There were concerts and cultural entertainment at every turn. And the spectator options for sports were suddenly overwhelming: Did you take

the day off to watch snowshoeing, dog mushing or Dene Games?

Having a massive group of people from exotic Arctic places such as Russia and Greenland suddenly descend on your city – enormously pleased and excited to be there – pumps excitement into the air with the oxygen and carbon dioxide.

It was impossible to be blase about the Games. One of my favourite parts was the little Russian competitors who kept turning up at my office, lost and looking for the bathroom. My colleagues and I would fight over who got to help our endearing visitors, language barrier notwithstanding. It brightened up life how often did I get to chat with a 15-year-old speed skater from the Yamal province of Russia?

Now, there are just a couple of weeks until the Games arrive in Grande Prairie and I too am enormously pleased and excited to be here, covering the lead-up for Ulu News.

A Beaverlodge native, I have finally returned home after university in Ottawa and three years as a reporter in the Northwest Territories, Nunavut and Egypt. It's a great time to be home.

I remember volunteering for the Canada Winter Games in 1995. Armed with a hockey puck and ice cream pail of snow, I earnestly packed holes in the ice for the figure skaters. The experience always stuck with me.


It's inspiring to be around topnotch young athletes. It's also inspiring to be shown the feats of which Grande Prairie is capable.

Every once in a while, a city needs a big event to remind everyone what can be accomplished when everyone pitches in for something good.
