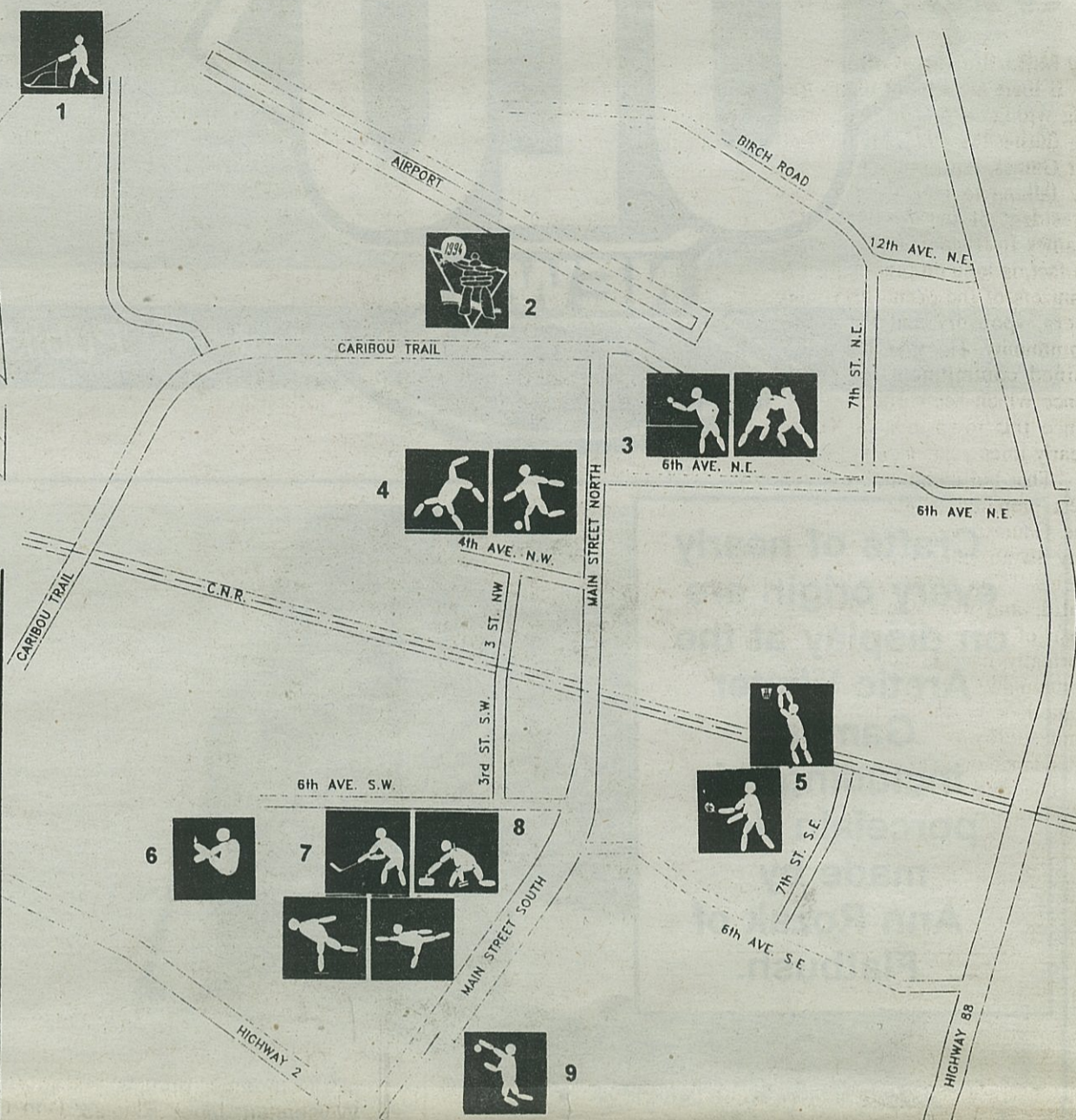
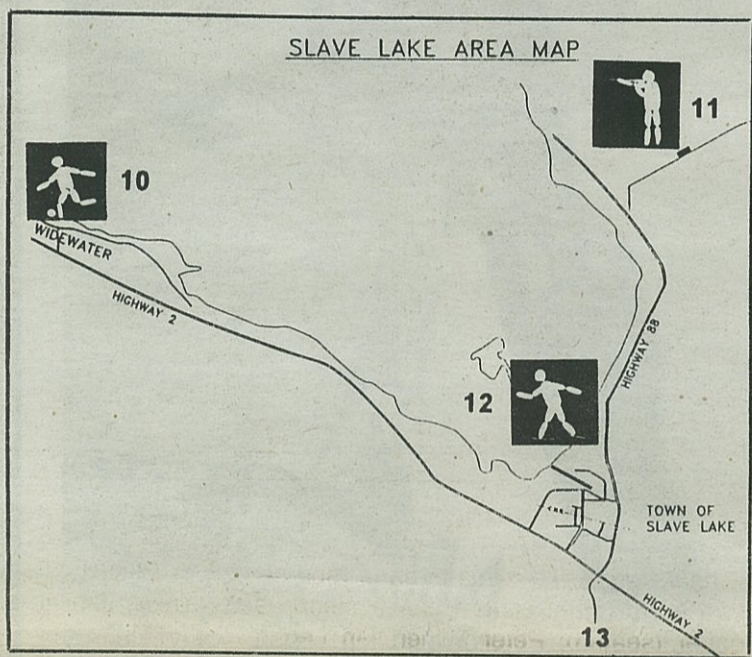

River of praises runs deep for community

If there are a lot of things going wrong — or not as planned — during the 1994 Arctic Winter Games, you couldn't prove it by talking to Don Cooper. The president of the Arctic Winter Games International Committee, in fact, is long on praises for organizers of the event, its volunteers, sponsors and the entire community. He says it's determined commitment for excellence which has carried through since this town created its bid nearly three years ago.

"That bid committee was the best prepared in the history of the Games," Cooper said Monday in an interview with Ulu News. "The preparations were solid, and over the (ensuing) span of two years when would normally have visited (the host community) four times, we only came here twice. We felt the organization was so solid that our attendance wasn't needed."

The International committee was not the least worried about

but Cooper said the international group had not noticed any shortcomings.

"It's still very early, though, and I'd be surprised if one or two things didn't crop up. They happen everywhere, even at the Olympics."

On the flip side, the Games have sparked something very positive and commendable from the entire community.

"(The Games) have mobilized the entire community, and I have a sense that they are very important to the entire community."

"The citizens have pulled out all the stops. It's a matter of civic pride which is not necessarily evident every other place."

Slave Lake businesses and residents are offering a delicious icing for an already incredibly tasty cake, he added, his praises coming fast and furious.

"We've noticed the little things, like the hotels haven't jacked up their rates," because of the event.

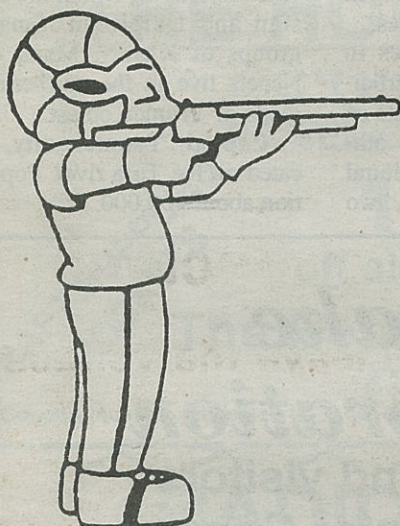

She comes from the village of Atammik, about 80 km north of the Greenland capital Nuuk. Her coach, and also a 23-year resident of Atammik, Vic McGregor, says Arnajaraq hasn't lost a game in competition here yet, and already has one gold ulu in the team event. "She hits the ball hard and has good reflexes," says McGregor. Arnajaraq is the youngest of nine children and her first name means 'little girl', in Greenlandic.

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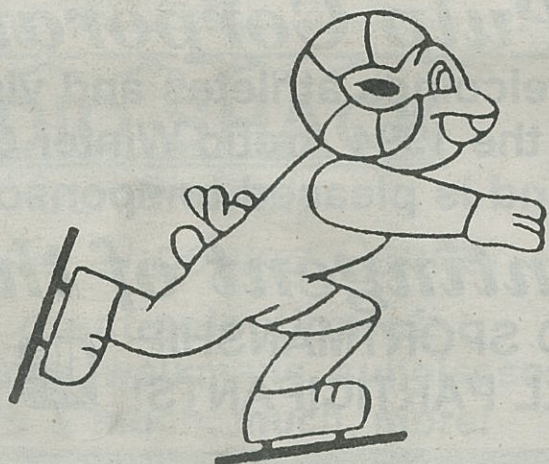

Contingent of the Day - Tyumen

Northern Alberta and Rus-
sia's Tyumen region have a lot
in common.

It's called oil. Black gold.
Tyumen tea.

swampy region just east of the
Ural Mountains, which divide
European Russia from Siberian
Russia. On one of those color-
coded topographical maps, most
of the plain looks like one

the north of Tyumen for the
next 375 years. They kept
heading east, leaving the big
muskeg the size of Alaska to
its native inhabitants.

As near as we've been able
to figure out, these are princi-
pally the Khanty, the Mansi
and the Nenets. The latter
group numbers about 30,000
and lives mainly in the north-
ern part of Tyumen oblast,
where reindeer herding is the
chief economic activity. Fishing
the mighty Ob River, which
flows through Tyumen from
south to north, is another tradi-
tional subsistence activity of
the region.

Big time change came to the
West Siberian Basin with the
discovery of oil in 1960. Since

then the population has doubled
many times over, to its present
2 1/2 million.

Vince Properzi of Slave
Lake is in Tyumen right now,
working in the Vat Yeganskoye
field, about 200 miles north of
Surgut, a city on the Ob. He's
been working 30 days on and
30 days off there going on two
years.

"I've picked up a little bit of
Russian," Properzi said last
month. He said he regrets not
being here to meet the Tyumen
contingent during the Games.

This is the first Games in
which Tyumen is a full partici-
pant. Team Tyumen consists of
35 members, including 24 ath-
letes and coaches, four cultural
performers, three officials, two

interpreters and two members
of the press. The athletes are
scheduled to compete in Arctic
sports, cross-country skiing and
ski biathlon.

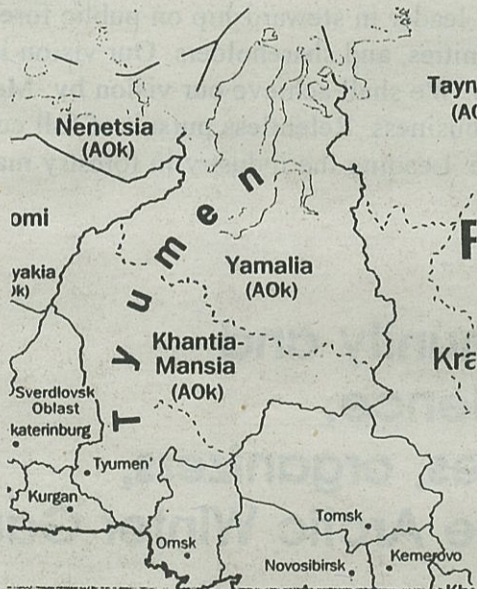
Tyumen facts

Area: 1,435,200 sq. km.

Location: More or less in
the middle of Russia, but in the
extreme west of Siberia. Most
of Tyumen lies north of the
55th parallel, which is roughly
the latitude of Slave Lake.

Population: 2.5 million, the
vast majority of whom are Rus-
sian and Ukrainian. Smaller
groups of Khanty, Mansi and
Nenets live in the northern re-
gions of Tyumen oblast.

Capital: Tyumen city, lo-
cated on the Tura river. Popula-
tion about 400,000.



As a matter of fact, Alberta
oilfield service companies are
over in Tyumen (pronounced
Tyoomain) as you read this,
helping coax the black stuff out
of the Siberian ground. Slave
Lakers Eric Key, Vince Prop-
erzi and Roland Eben-Ebenau
among others have spent time
working in the Tyumen oil
patch in the past couple of
years.

Most of Tyumen oblast (re-
gion) is located in the vast
West Siberian Plain, a low,

big swamp. And according to
Key, who worked in the Malo
field near Nizhnevartovsk, the
area bears an "uncanny" resem-
blance to the countryside
around Nipisi north of Slave
Lake.

"Flat, muskeg, dwarf trees,"
is how Key describes it.

The city of Tyumen is actu-
ally the oldest Russian settle-
ment in Siberia, established in
1585 by Cossacks in search of
furs. But for the most part,
Russia ignored the vast lands to

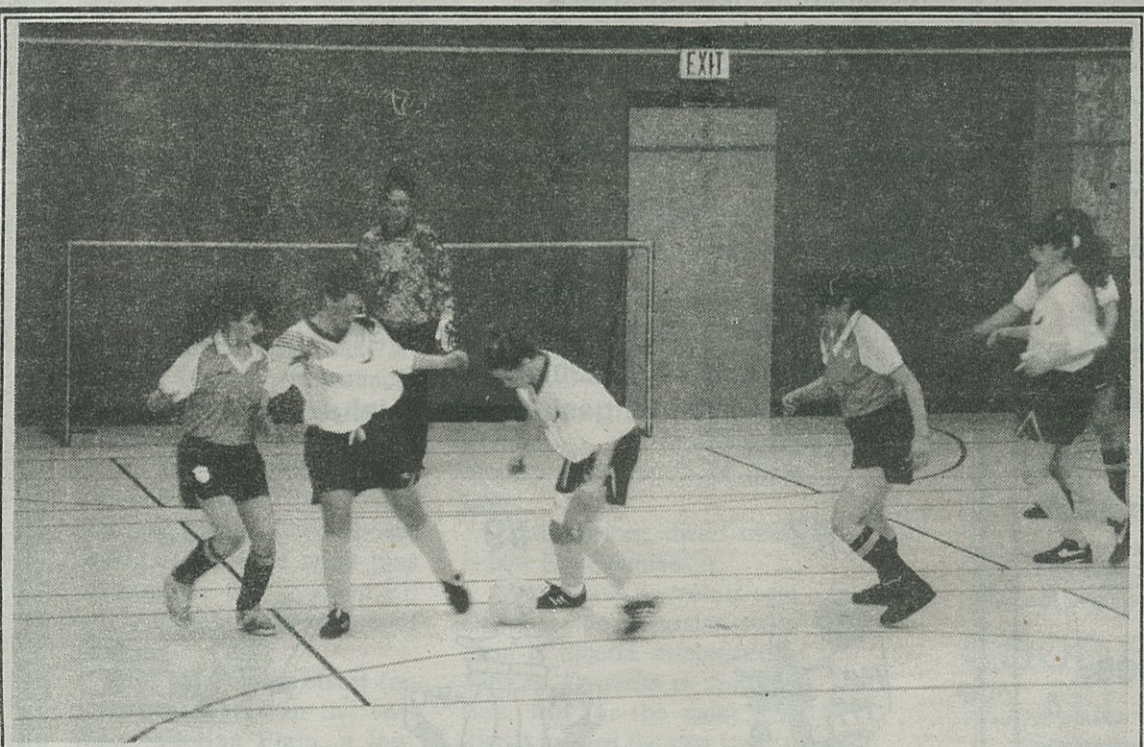

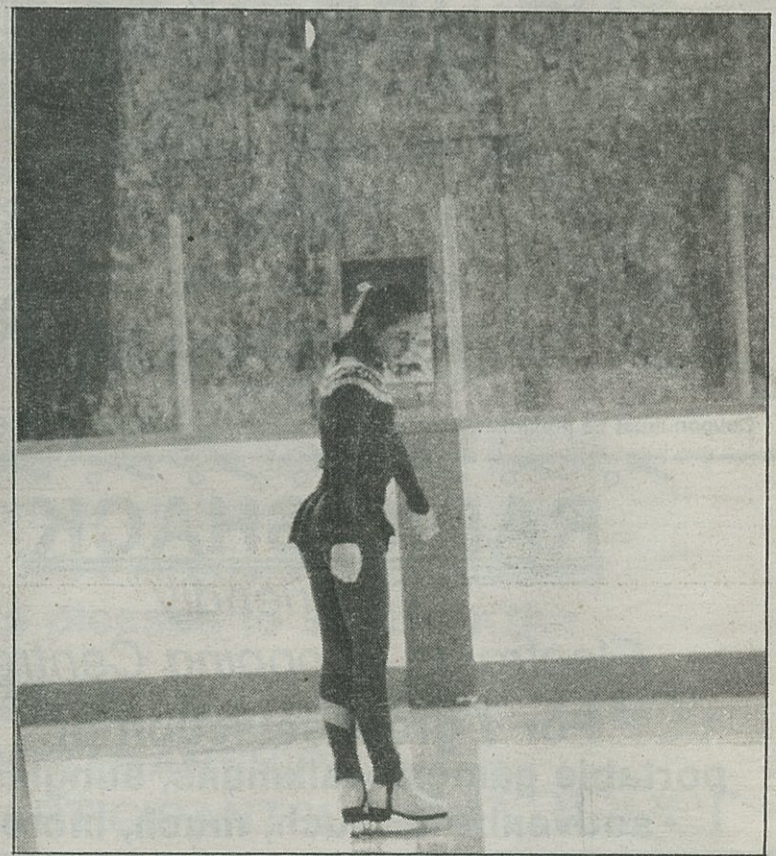


Figure skating also saw its first day of competition Tuesday with mens' and womens' preliminaries. Skating continued Wednesday, but no results were available by press time.

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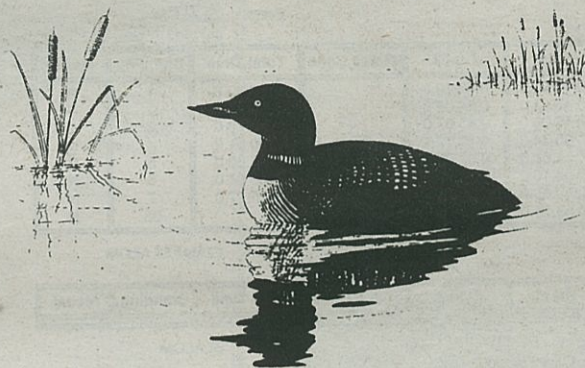
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AWG concert scene

It would have been a perfect morning out on the lake even if nothing had been going on there. As it was, the flags were flying, the dogs yipping, mushing teams and spectators milling around — all enjoying bright sunshine and no wind (for a change) at the Sawridge Recreation dog racing venue.

"I've never seen anything nicer," said team Yukon coach Bob English. "It's perfect for kids."

Dog mushing at these Games is restricted to competitors under 19 years of age. Some are as young as 12 years. English said the track is fairly icy, but is fast and safe.

Team Alberta coach Jack Tobin of Ft. McMurray is also impressed by the venue and the organization of the event. It's his

first Arctic Winter Games, and his star pupil Curtis Byrne and his team of Siberian Huskies is

competing for the first time.

"Hats off to the organizers," said Tobin, whose fox fur hat matches his own red locks. "It's a success before it starts."

As the snow flies, then gets deeper, he creates his runs by pulling a weight behind the snowmobile to pack the snow. But too much snow can be just as aggravating as too little. With snowfalls coming nearly daily in January, the musher says he spent almost as much time making the trails as driving them.

"We're like farmers, we're never happy" with the weather, he laughs.

Mushers have to be fairly athletic too, he admits. Running after and controlling that kind of dog-power is demanding, he says. It's even more necessary to be in shape when mushers have to control frightened or wayward dogs.

Unlike their predecessors which were trained purely for transportation purposes, today's sled dogs know few voice commands.

"We teach them to 'go', not 'stop', 'left' or 'right'. And they run flat out, like running in a tunnel."

Hamilton feeds his dogs a mixture of ground chicken and liver, with a sprinkling of vitamin supplement. The dogs also need six to eight cups of water every day.

"They sweat a lot and you need to keep their electrolytes balanced. They get the most out of the food you're giving them that way."

Water is an essential, he says, and also prevents the dogs from wanting to stop during a race to quench their thirst by eating snow.

When the dogs are on the racing circuit, he gives each about 1.5 pounds of solids every day, or more if it's cold out. Hamilton also likes to top up the rations with beef fat or oil when the mercury drops.

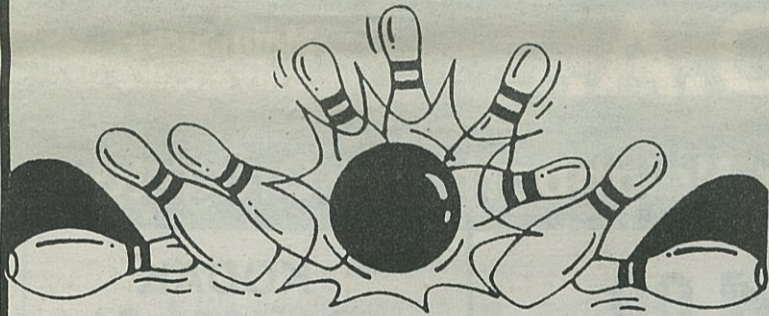
Hamilton's love of the sport is obvious even though he admits he did quit for a time 11 years ago when he moved to Wabasca. But like the call of the wild, his love for mushing haunted him until he resumed the pace.

After all, what else are winners for in the 'land of ice and snow'?

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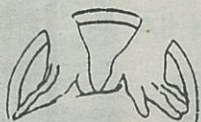
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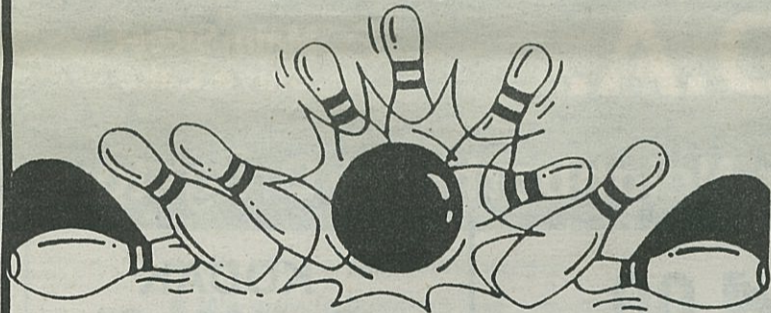
