Russians learning from experience Look for Committee pins

Thousands of miles from home, in an unfamiliar country playing an unfamiliar sport — that was the position the Team Russia Arctic Sports team found themselves in this week.

The Russians had never sent a team to compete in Arctic Sports before this year.

Since they had never competed in the events before, the Russians had no way of knowing how to perform the sports. They relied on books and videos as their sole source of instruction.

Coach Alexander Guerassimtchuk, speaking through interpreter Andrey Zheleznikov, said that other teams' coaches have been very helpful to the newcomers.

One of the opposing teams' coaches even showed the Russian competitors how to improve their technique in one of the events.

"We had a much better result," the coach said.

The Games were even more challenging for the Russians, since the team only had three months to train for the events.

The team's spirit has apparently paid off. "We're doing good. We've won two bronze medals," Guerassimtchuk said.

Let's start out today with a word about the Arctic Winter Games International Committee gold ulu's. There are three types of International committee pins out there.

The first is the gold ulu with the year and the words Arctic Winter Games on it. The second type is the ulu with word "president" on the bottom. (P.S. Gerry Thick is the current president, hint ... hint.) The third is the three bisecting circles "logo" pin. Just look for members of the international board and see what they'll trade for!

The pin trading seems to be at its best in the Valley River Center pin traders corner and at various venue sites. Another hot spot is down at the ice wall in Eagle River Town Square during the awards ceremonies!

Be creative, don't just limit yourself to pins. This might be the opportunity to line a trade on a jacket or hat. Greenland has great jacket and lots of folks want one of them.

The Russian pins are out there and available. The Tyumen and Magadan teams have lots of traders. There are several style Russian pins available and everyone seems to have something a little different.

There are two MACTel pins, one for the sport they are sponsoring. The hockey seems to be the hardest of the two to locate but alpine skiing is not far behind!

Don't forget about the NWT team's pins. These are great and it is fun to try to collect them all, or at least your favorite sites or around the athlete's village it's

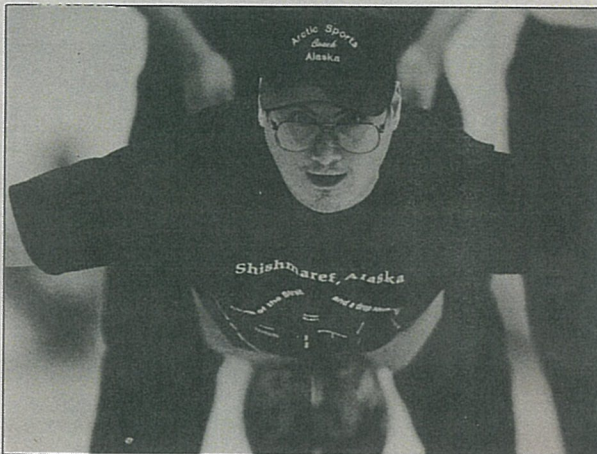

Former Games participant to taste Olympic dream

Those participating in the Arctic Winter Games have all had dreams of what being an Olympic athlete must be like. One former Games participant and coach will get a taste of the Olympic dream as a torch bearer.

Kathy Gliva, chairwoman of the Games' speedskating events, will run the Olympic torch on part of the stretch destined for Atlanta, Ga. and the summer Olympics to be held in July.

Gliva is one of 10 Alaskans or "Community Heroes" given the honor.

The Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games (ACOG) awarded these "community heroes" the honor of carrying the torch in a press conference held last month at Anchorage Mayor Rick Mystrom's office.

The Community Heroes were selected based on their outstanding contributions and service to others and the community. Almost 150 judging panels across the U.S. selected 5,500 Community Heroes to participate.

"The 10 people selected as torchbearers are all wonderful examples of the greater good of Alaska," said Arliss Sturgulewski, Alaska judging panel member. "Alaska is filled with heroes, and, while not everyone could be chosen as a torchbearer, we believe the Community Heroes presented here today represent what is best about Alaska."

"These people embrace what is best about America," said Billy Payne, president and CEO of ACOG. "The sacred Olympic flame is a time-honored icon of peace, friendship and humanitarianism, and we are confident that as these torchbearers carry the flame, they will play an important role as local ambassadors, igniting the Olympic spirit in thousands of communities across America."

The 1996 Olympic Torch Relay spans 15,000 miles and travels through 42 states for

84 days. The Alaskan torchbearers will each make a one-kilometer run in the Seattle-Tacoma, Wash. area.

Running one of those kilometers will be Gliva.

"I was pretty shocked that I was actually chosen," Gliva said. "I am thrilled and it really means a lot to me to be able to participate in the Olympics, even though it is a small part."

Gliva was nominated by her husband Ed and a group of friends. She said she had no knowledge of it until she got a call asking her to be at the press conference last month.

"As I look back on my life, whenever I watch the Olympics I was just in awe of those participating," Gliva said. She said she had dreams of her own of about competing in the Olympics in either horseback riding or speed skating.

In 1976, Gliva started a women's hockey team in Alaska. From there, she became involved with speed skating. "And then I got involved with Arctic Winter Games."

Gliva has attended four Arctic Games and has coached both triathlon teams as well as speed skating teams. She is currently serving as chairwoman of the speed skating event.

Horseback riding is the torchbearer's other love. "I have been involved with horses since I was two."

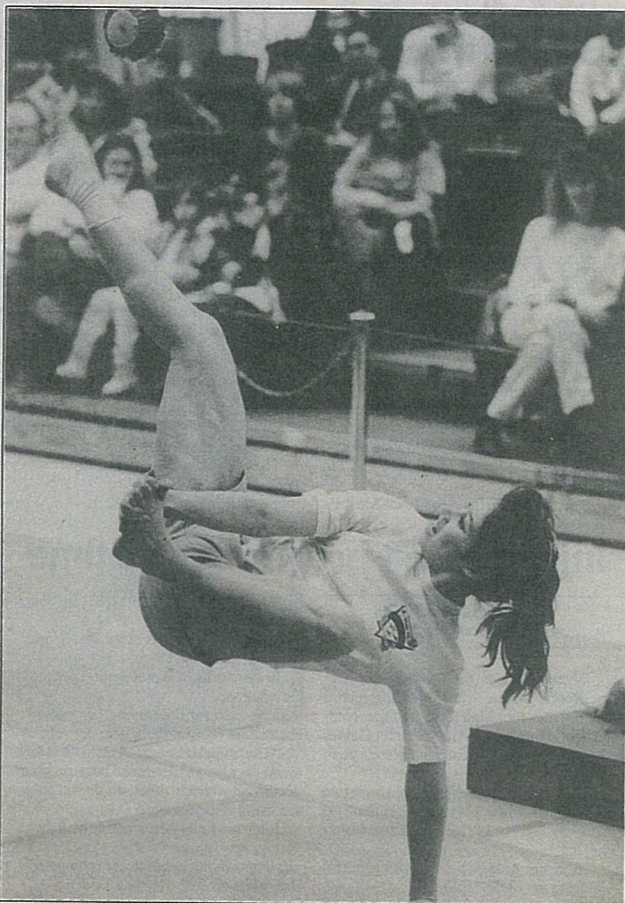
Now, she and her husband have EKG Stables, "the stable with a heart."

And the stable with a heart is helping many hearts with "special needs."

Gliva operates STRIDE — the Southcentral Therapeutic Riding club.

"It helps people with special needs achieve a sense of accomplishment and well being," Gliva said. She added that they are in the process of building an indoor arena so the program can operate year-round.

When asked if she was ready to run the kilometer, she said she hopes she can do it on horseback.

Injury won't prevent good time

Nicole Johnson, the Team Alaska Arctic Sports athlete who holds the record for the two-foot high kick, said that competing in this year's Arctic Winter Games is going to be a greater challenge than any year so far.

The athlete sprained her right knee two weeks ago while playing basketball, so she will be forced to kick with her weaker left leg.

"I'm not going to risk (permanently) injuring my knee," she said.

Johnson said that she thinks this will be the first time she hasn't won a medal in every event she's tried for at the Games. She was 12 years old when she entered

her first competition, at the Native Youth Olympics.

She won 12 medals at the last World Eskimo and Indian Olympics.

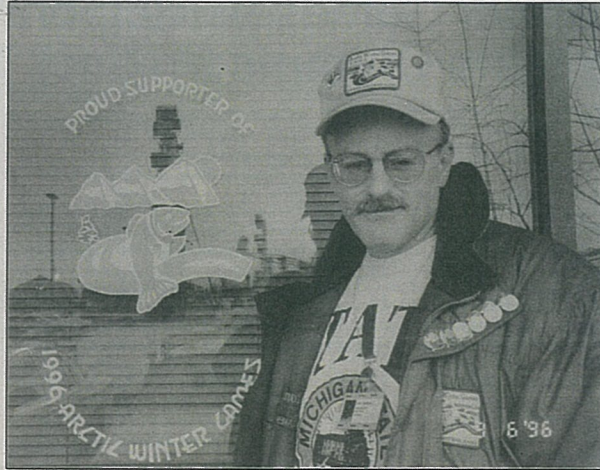
In the words of fiance John Johnston, "She's good."

Johnson is still enjoying her experience at the Games, though.

"The experience at Arctic Winter Games is always wonderful because you get to visit with and meet people you only see every two years.

Johnson finds it rewarding to teach young, new athletes Native games. "It's just as gratifying to coach as to compete," she said.

"If you can help (new athletes) achieve their personal best, you're as much a winner as they are."

He then found out that the man's name was Uri.

Then at the Mayor's banquet Monday night, Creviston ran into Uri again, and time an interpreter was with him. "Finally, I have a chance to tell each other what we been trying to communicate for two years he said.

"Through the interpreter, he said to 'You have a beautiful wife. Then he went away with a big smile on his face,' Creviston said. "He's right — my wife Margaret is beautiful," he added, smiling.

Games spirit puts twist on dog mushing event

"It's just another dog race," grinned Jerry Raychel, race marshal for the Arctic Winter Games dog mushing events at the Beach Lake trails in Birchwood.

"Except for the ceremonies," he added after casting a glance at the venue stand where flags of the participating nations stretched in the breeze.

Those ceremonies and the Games spirit put an entirely different twist on the sled dog races, something that has become commonplace for Alaskans. Opening ceremonies for the dog mushing were held yesterday morning at the start and finish line on the edge of Beach Lake. The playing of the national anthems of the participating countries, with excited dogs barking in the background, made the Games races unique.

The setting itself was different than the one normally used for races of the Chugiak Dog Musher's club, and different from the Eagle River Classic held there just a couple of weeks earlier.

Start and finish lines were set up on the lake itself, Raychel said, at the request of Games officials. "It gives a better view for spectators," he said, than is available from the normal starting line used by the mushers club.

"They all seem happy to be here," the race marshal said of the 16 mushers who were taking part in three days of racing.

That number was smaller than expected. Teams from Greenland, Magadan and Tyumen were not represented.

"It's more a problem of them getting the dogs back home than getting them here," Raychel said of the absent mushers. Long quarantine periods and strict regulations in Russia and Greenland made it necessary for

competitors from those countries to cancel plans to come to Eagle River.

The Canadian mushers from Northwest Territory, Yukon Territory and Alberta and those from other parts of Alaska "seem happy with the trails," Raychel noted. He credited mushing sport chairman Bill Waddell for the

meter runs yesterday afternoon. He had just returned from a personal inspection of the track by snowmachine.

High winds which whipped up Monday night and blew all day Tuesday had devastated the trail a crew of volunteers had spent "many, many hours" in building.

chairman said, and that pleased him.

There is little difference between dog mushing in Alaska and in Canada, Waddell said, his remarks confirmed by coaches and officials of the Northwest Territory contingent. Participation by mushers from both countries in popular races over the years has brought their techniques and equipment to an equal footing.

The Birchwood trails, though, were a little unusual for the Canadians. They are accustomed to flat terrain and found the hilly, twisty Beach Lake trail to be "a bit of a challenge."

Another difference is that the Canadians do not have a separate junior musher program like that provided in Alaska. Juniors participate along with adults in their races.

"We work them in early," commented a jovial Team Northwest coach who joined in the conversation.

Yesterday's races covered 7.5 kilometers with four dogs for juveniles or 10 kilometers with six dogs for juniors. Results were kept for individual racers with ulus to be issued this morning.

Today the mushers will compete as teams with the two entries from each contingent combining their times to determine team standings.

On Friday, each class will add one more dog and the race route will be two kilometers longer. Juveniles will run five dogs over a 10k trail while the juniors will mush a 13k loop, driving seven dogs.

Individual medals were won by juveniles Christie Couckuyt of Alaska (gold), Chad Wood of Northwest Territories (silver) and Alison Cousins of Alberta (bronze).

Nita Hollingsworth of the Alaska team won the gold for the juniors with a time of 18:16.

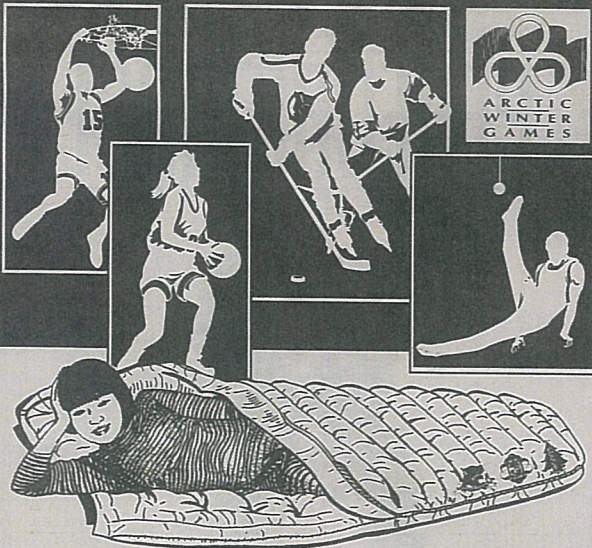

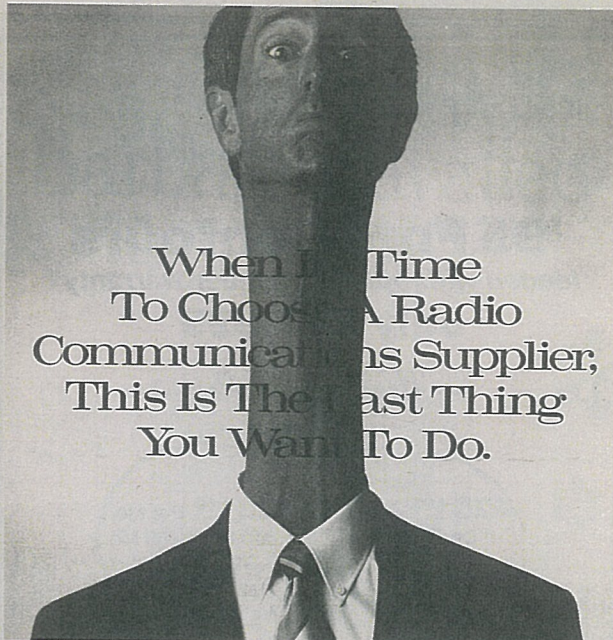

Alaska sweeps girls midget ski race

The Team Alaska quartet of Jesi Kinnevan, Diana Johnson, Tara Hamilton and Mishelle Norris swept the top four places of the 5 kilometer Midget cross-country ski race yesterday at Beach Lake Trails. Kinnevan earned her second gold medal of the Arctic Winter Games with a time of 16 minutes, 44 seconds. "The course was really flat and really fast," described Kinnevan. "There were a lot of easy hills." This is the second time the quartet has swept the top four spots during the Games. Sara Rottman of Team Alaska also earned

her second gold medal in the juvenile female division. Rottman covered the 7.5 kilometer freestyle race in 24 minutes, 28 seconds.

For the second time during the Games, Jeanette Peterson of Greenland finished second with a time of 25 minutes, 17 seconds. Amy Seifert, of Team Alaska, finished 17 seconds behind Peterson for third place.

Balmy temperatures reaching into the 30s provided the "perfect" weather for racing yesterday.

"It was good," commented juvenile racer Rachel James, who finished fifth. "I saved it until the end. I was dying, then all of sudden I was like, oh, I should have gone harder."

Junior racer Leslie Boyd of Team Alaska broke into the Russian domination and finished the 10 kilometer race in 34 minutes, 6 seconds. Boyd finished 18 seconds behind second place finisher Natalia Korreeva of Tyumen. Yesterday's race earned Boyd her second bronze medal.

On the boys' side, Eric Strabel and John Jockusch finished second and third in the 7.5 kilometer juvenile race. Jockusch placed third in the cross-country ski meet on Monday. Strabel was only 18 seconds behind first-place finisher Martin Moller of Greenland.

"It was a fun race," juvenile skier Martin Miller of Team Alaska described enthusiastically.

"For most of the race I had a guy who was six-foot-eight ahead of me.

"I'm definitely looking forward to Friday's race. I'm better at classic," added Miller, who finished seventh yesterday.

The amazing Russian skiers won the 10 kilometer boys' junior race. Ivan Vichniakov of Magadan finished first with an impressive time of 27 minutes, 23 seconds. Dmitrii Shelepov, Vladimir Robkanov and Dmitrii Veliianin of Tyumen finished second, third and fourth.

The third race for cross-country skiing is a classic race on Friday. Friday's results will determine the three-person relay teams for Saturday.

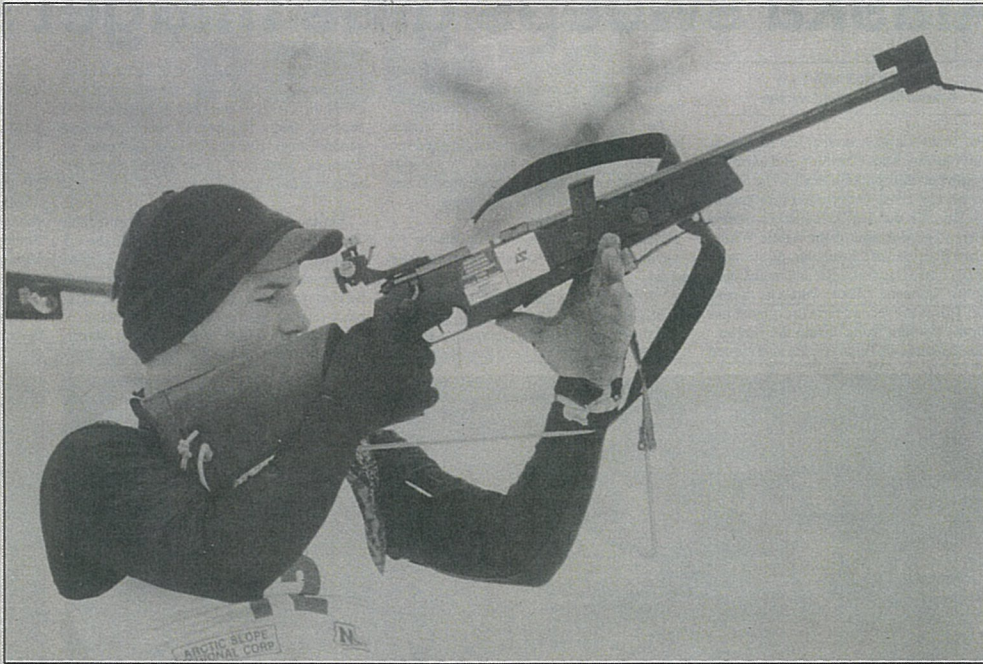

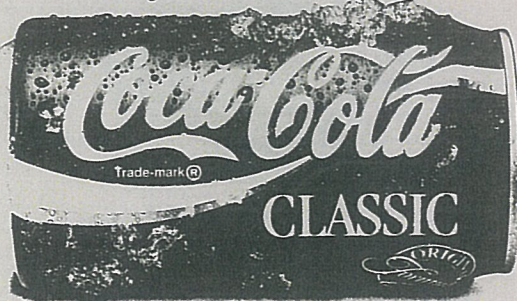

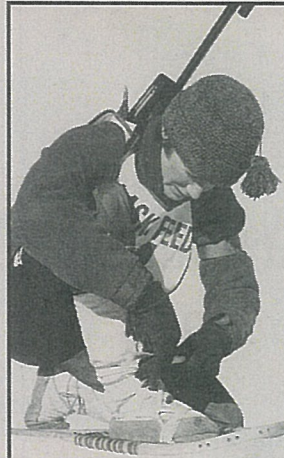

The ride was long, but so was history

Athletes participating in the ski and snowshoe biathlon events had to go a long way before they even got to the starting line. With athletes housed in Eagle River but the courses set in Kincaid Park in Southwest Anchorage, contestants faced at least two 45-minute bus rides each day.

Jerry Walton, outdoor recreation supervisor for Anchorage's Parks and Recreation department, said if athletes knew the distinguished history of the trail they were using, the bus ride might seem worth it. The events were held across town for an important reason.

"This is a world class facility," Walton said. "It's been the site of the Winter Olympics tryouts and the site of the North American and U.S. Championships," he said.

In December of 1994, would-be Olympic contenders vied for a spot on the team that would eventually go to Lillehammer. "That's the same course these athletes are skiing now," Walton said.

As a matter of fact, Walton said the trails at Kincaid Park are on their way toward becoming certified by an international skiing organization, making it one of only two in the U.S. under such consideration (the other is at

Lake Placid in New York).

Officials did at one point consider setting up some kind of temporary course in Eagle River, but thought against it, he said. "To have a facility like this that's world class and not use it — that would be criminal," he said.

The chalet at the park was considered another bonus when deciding to hold events there. The building has an athletes' lounge as well as office space, plenty of room to store gear — and a breathtaking view of Mount McKinley, otherwise known as Denali, the tallest mountain on the North American continent.

What athletes might not know is that the site's distinguished history goes farther back than most would imagine. The chalet itself used

to house U.S. Army soldiers instead of skiers and anti-aircraft missiles instead of sports equipment.

Much of the land that is now Kincaid Park was until recently the Point Campbell Military Reserve. The reserve became part of the park in 1983, Walton said.

The rooms athletes used this week to store gun cases and ski coverings used to hold cable raceways where Nike Hercules missiles could launch out of to the west and south of the point. One of the cables is still in place, as is much of the original military paint.

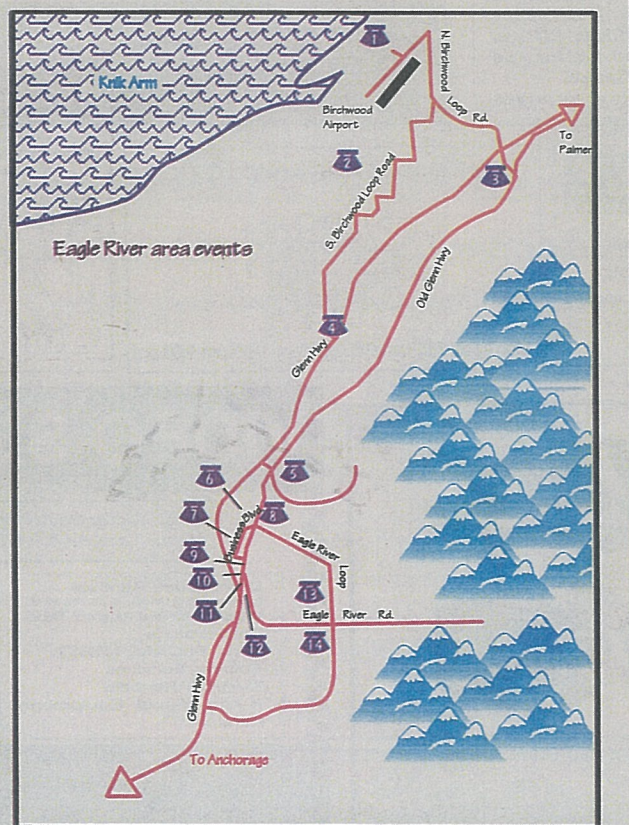
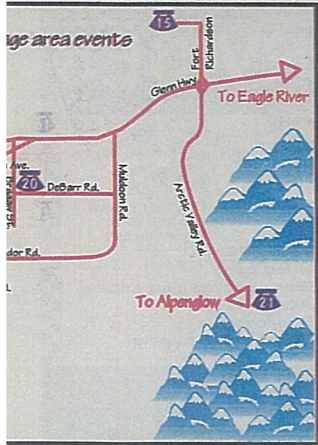
