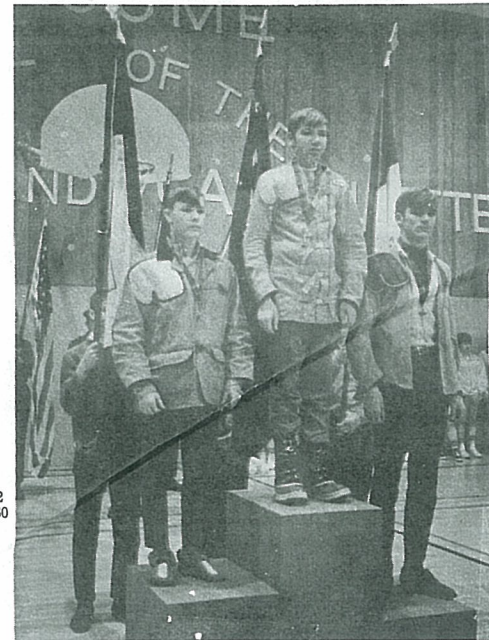
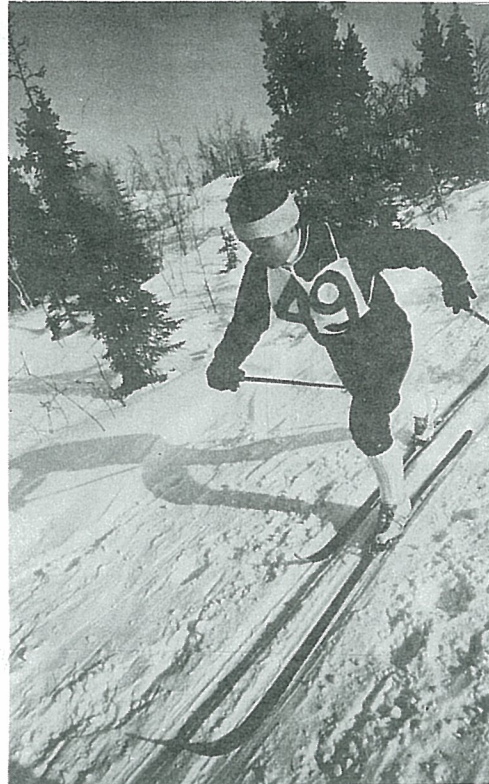
## A Wire from Mayor Kaeser

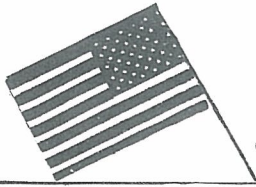

If you want to be an expert skater, Petra Burka offers simple requirements - "Ambition and self discipline".

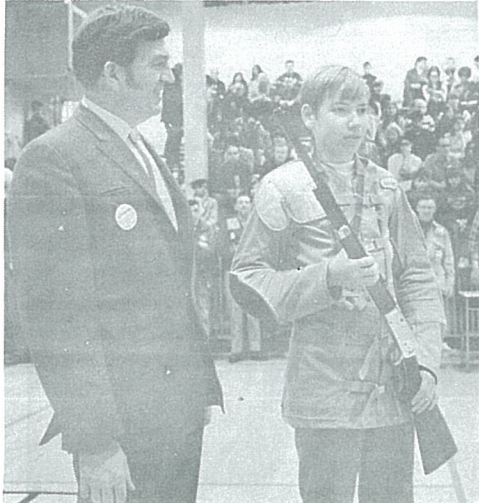

Richard Hardy - PR Director, Olivetti Underwood - "I have never seen such a spirit of teamwork involved in a sporting event...citizens of Yellowknife should be very proud of the high standard of the games. It is even more extraordinary that the games could have been done on such a low budget but it is quite evident that in place of money, they have used teamwork and initiative."

Strangely enough, one of the Alaskan participants in the Arctic Winter Games is actually more famous in a sport he is not competing in...Gordy Gladson is a qualified basketball referee, and a coach of his high school championship team...and he's getting plenty of action during the games. However, the easy going guy with the big fists can lay claim to bigger things....He is a three time middle-weight NAAA boxing champion, and during the early years of his fistic career, took on two of the top boxers of the world. In 1952, he took on Floyd Patterson and lost out on a split decision....He looked around a little more, and then tackled Archie Moore in three no decision fights....How did he make out??? Gordy said, "I got one good one in the 2nd round, and really shook him up - that was my best shot." Gordy has had 186 fights, and never been KO'd....Ulu News Pat Munro looked at Gordy's fist, and realized why.....
